Epiphany—the Manifestation of Christ to All Nations

Our Vision and the Ministry Christ is calling us to

Christ has come and is coming and we are waiting. Born among us, born within us, anointed in the Spirit at his Baptism, tempted by the devil, which we come back to in Lent, started moving amongst the people, preaching, teaching, healing and performing miracles. One many of us would appreciate, turning water into wine. Announcing his ministry in his home synagogue, setting the tone for Epiphany where we celebrate

‘the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles, to all nations’.

“The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

His ministry is our ministry, his life is our life

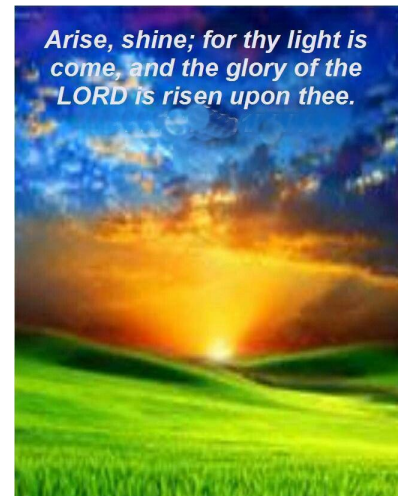
At a time when we as a parish are reflecting upon our Parish Vision, we need to reflect on the ministry that we have in Christ to all people, especially in our local communities. How we are bringing good news to the poor, proclaiming release to the captives, recovery of sight to the blind, helping free the oppressed and proclaiming the year of the Lord’s favour.

For Israel, the year of the Lord’s favour reminded them of the Jubilee.

The Jubilee was first referred to in Leviticus 25 as part of the law given by God to the Israelites. These verses describe God’s intent that the Israelites should remain free from slavery for all time by instituting a Sabbath year every seven years. The Jubilee year – occurring after every seventh Sabbath year, thus, every 50 years – is an economic, cultural, environmental and communal reset, when the land and people rest, and all those who are in slavery are set free to return to their communities. The Jubilee laws are essentially concerned with social relationship, economic security, stability and the wellbeing of the community. They seek to ensure that people live in ways that reflect good relationships with God, with each other, and with creation.

Interestingly, despite their focus on the law given to Moses, the Jubilee was not really practised by Israel.

CB Samuel, a Bible teacher, pastor, theologian, mentor, former CEO of a major Indian relief and development

organization (EFICOR), missiologist, evangelical leader and passionate advocate for the poor, wrote *“The assumption is that it was not practised. But that does not mean it is not an important law... The law was given to the*

people of Israel so that they would know the intention of God, the heart of God.”

Hence Jesus calling us back to the heart of God and the centrality of the Jubilee in God’s purpose.

As human beings we might not yet have paid sufficient attention to the Jubilee but is central to the ministry of Jesus in our ministry in the time to come as we wait for him Jesus to come again.

Global Poverty is a complex issue. We have progressed from 76% of the global population living in extreme poverty some 200 years ago, when real progress in reducing poverty started to make significant gains, to 9% living in extreme poverty in recent times. The benchmark being currently earning less than \$2.15 per day or \$784 per year. This was largely achieved through the United Nations Millennium Development Goals which included the Jubilee year in 2000, global economic growth and particularly the global availability of education.

Currently, there is significant concern that this progress has and will stall this decade (2020-2030).

Although these figures are encouraging, they are also deceptive without finding ways to assess the impact of the increase of wealth of the wealthiest people in the world. Currently, the richest 1% own 45% of Global Wealth, whilst 44% of humanity live on less than \$6.85 per day (\$2,500 p.a.) according to a recent Oxfam Report. In short, the gap between rich and poor is increasing. This will only get worse with the current trend of the wealthiest gaining more access to political power as we are seeing in America at this time.

Imagine if there was a true global Jubilee and all wealth was redistributed equitably. The wealth of the billionaires and multimillionaires, the wealth of

the nations distributed equitably. A few years ago, a French Economist, Thomas Piketty proposed a global Tax on Wealth.

Although a global jubilee is a lofty goal, that we might think is unachievable, if we are to take Jesus seriously then we need to focus on how it can be achieved. The steps necessary for us and every human being to take in working towards achieving it.

As a small congregation, we can easily become despondent, yet we need to celebrate the ministry we are sharing in. Celebrate that growing in Christ both personally and communally can make a difference.



Our regular worship is the foundation of all we do.

Reflecting and coming to a deeper understanding and experience of the Gospel God reveals to us in Christ.

We need to encourage people to join us. Too often we see asked

telling people about Christ proclaiming Christ to them when in fact when a person joins us in worship the experience of Christ of each and everyone of us is deepened. Each person has Christ within them.

similarly, Christ comes to us as we reach out to all in need. We have good outreach ministries in this parish which we can continue to develop as well as creating new ones. Our Op shops and the outreach programs through the Madge Purnell centre. The ‘Get Out for Good’ program, the meditation silent prayer group, the ‘Listening Post’, our parish website, Our various parish activities dash study groups mothers union and various social events , are vital ministries.

Keeping focus on what we are trying to achieve through these groups and activities is more important than thinking about the numbers of people that might be part of them. they're all potential

Archdeacon Sue Jacka

We received news from the Bishop that Sue Jacka is vacating the position of Archdeacon. A message of thanks is to be sent regarding the role she has played and for her support during the time of vacancy at our church.

Treasurer

Bruce Charles was appointed provisional Parish Treasurer, a role to be taken up after January. We are very grateful for Bruce's willingness to take up this important position. Thank you to Jan Misiurka for being our wonderful treasurer over this past year. Danielle Matthews will continue as our Book keeper, continuing to significantly reduce the load of the treasurer.

Op Shops

Our Op Shops continue to make a valued contribution to our community.

At Yallourn North, Glenis reported that the Op Shop re-opened with \$1 000 made on the first very hectic day!

Anzac St Moe has re-opened. New heavier duty racks are needed to support weightier clothing.

Newborough Op shop is facing some challenges. Due to a new two year lease arrangement from Strzelecki Realty plus a rise in rental without an improvement in the state of the shop and uncertain availability of volunteers, the operation of the shop is becoming untenable. The Newborough Op Shop is going to close pending advice. Gwyneth and the volunteer team have done an outstanding job over the past year, in what was a very trying time. It has taken its toll in energy/health/mentally, so we need to be very mindful of this.

The outreach into the community through all our Op Shops is tangible, be it to our customers or our volunteers and we are blessed with some wonderful, caring volunteers who help in so many ways.

Listening Post

We have a very small cohort of volunteers involved with this ministry and we are in need of further support to continue plus a greater presence in the wider community.

Several requests for food support were received during the break to which Jan responded with assistance.

Some parishioners are donating money so that fresh supplies can be added to that which is available. Thank you so much.

Parish Vision

The draft for the Church vision and mission statement was approved with amendments. It is to be sent out/ received by parishioners for advice and or additions etc. The ideas will be collated and reported upon by 12th February.

Get out for Good—using restorative justice for the Kingdom of God.

Begins Tuesday 4th February 2025, in the Madge Vinnell Centre, 10am—2pm.

A program in partnership with the Anglican Criminal Justice Ministry established by Anglicare Victoria. An Anglican Church Welfare Agency.

The “Get out for Good” program, is for people who have been released from prison to find social and emotional support. Through our Drop in Centres, phone calls and informal meetings we provide a safe space to talk about what they are going through and encouragement to reconnect with family, friends and community. The program acts to strengthen people’s ability to identify and develop their own resources and build capacity while making the adjustment from prison to the “outside”.

Consecration of Archdeacon Scott Lowrey as Bishop in the Church of God

SATURDAY February 8th

Archdeacon Scott Lowrey is to be consecrated Bishop at Saint Paul's Cathedral Melbourne at 10.30a.m. This will be one of the last services conducted by Archbishop Frier as he retires on the 10th February.



Father Scott is currently the Rector of Warrnambool in the Diocese of Ballarat and is Vicar General of the Diocese. After his consecration he will remain at Warrnambool but hold the Office of Assistant Bishop of Ballarat.

Fr. Scott was born in Warragul and grew up in that parish and as a young adult was active in Diocesan Youth Ministry. He was ordained Deacon in 1990 and Priest in 1991

He served as Assistant Deacon at Leongatha 1990-1 and Assistant Priest 1991-4. He then served as Assistant Priest of Korumburra 1993-4 before being inducted as Rector of Orbost 1994-8. He then became Rector of Moe 1998-2007 before moving to Warrnambool.

Fr Scotts wife Felicity (nee Johns) in the early 1990's was a teacher at Saint Kieran's in Moe and was a GFS Leader in the parish. Her father, the Reverend Barry Johns, was Deaconed and Priested in Gippsland in 1983 and served in the parishes of Leongatha, Sale, Trafalgar & Moe.

Our prayers are with Father Scott, and his Family, as he prepares for his Consecration.

- 2. DRESS UP** The best way to dress is to put on a smile. A smile is an inexpensive way to improve your looks. "The Lord does not look at the things people often looks at. People often look at outward appearances, but the Lord looks at the heart (1 Samuel 16:7)
- 3. SHUT UP!** (as a kid I was never allowed to use those words) However this means to say nice things and learn to LISTEN. God gave us two ears and one mouth, perhaps He may have meant us to do twice as much listening as talking? (Proverbs 13:3 says, "He who guards his lips guards his soul."

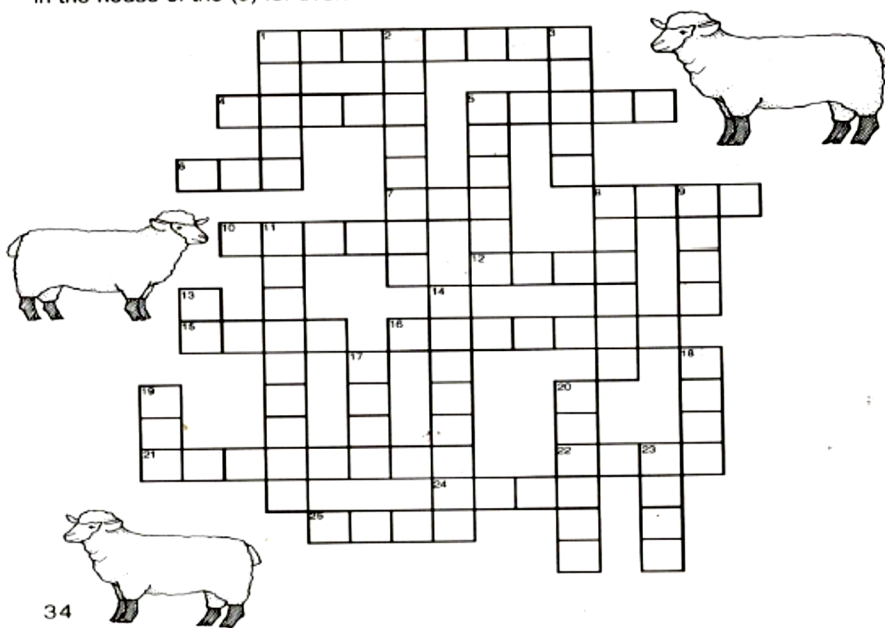

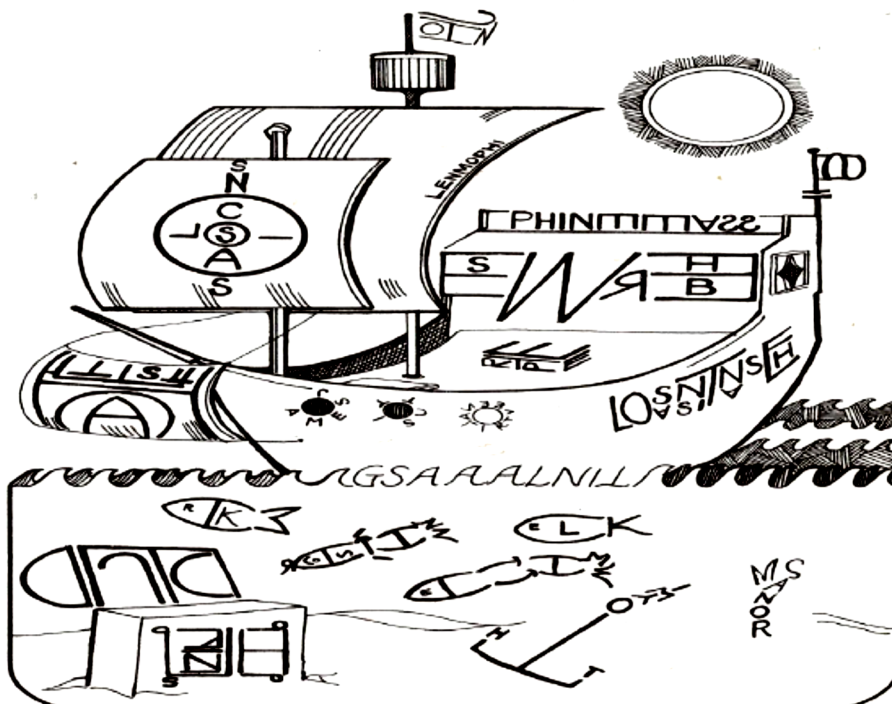

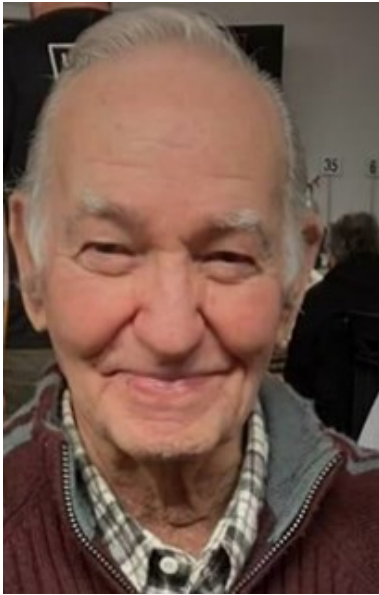

Our friend and fellow parishioner, Bill, died on January 1st and his funeral was held on January 8th. He was 91 years old.

For the last few months, he was resident in Respect-Baw Baw Views Home for the Aged as he suffered from Dementia.

The Reverend Gradwell Fredericks, Rector of Traralgon, presided over the celebration of Bill's life at the Latrobe Funeral Services Chapel in Newborough. Bill was the 2nd youngest of twelve children living in a three-bedroom house in Boronia. He moved to the Latrobe Valley where he worked as a Fitter and Turner for the SEC retiring in 1991. He was married to Margaret for 65 years with their family of 5 children which now has expanded with many more grandchildren and great grandchildren. Two of his sons, Steven and Robbie, spoke of their family life including many holidays and his support for them in their sporting involvement especially when he had the role of a trainer for their football matches. We of course all knew of his passion for his beloved "Hawks".

We of course knew him for his sharing with us the journey of faith at Saint Aidan's. He was involved in so many ways over many years in Newborough Parish. For him some of the most special moments were being able to share his faith with others such as at schools during RE classes and at the Aged Care Facilities services. He involved himself in the administration of the church through serving on Parish Council, Mission Secretary and on Synod. He edited the Church Newsletter "Alive" and for many years welcomed us all to Church through the tolling of the Church Bell.

VALE JUDITH MARY JACKSON



Judith passed away peacefully in her sleep beside Ray at their home sometime in the early morning of Saturday the 28th of December after some years of frailty and diminishing health. Her funeral was held at 1.30pm on Monday 6th January 2025, at St Aidan's. A packed church being a wonderful tribute to her and support for Ray and her family.

Judith Mary Jackson formerly Cook and was born on the 2nd of January 1935 in the Traralgon hospital, the youngest of Oswald and Mabel Martins's eight children.

Judith grew up in Glengarry, attending the Glengarry Primary School and then Traralgon High School, where she was a prefect in her last year and very active in sport. Judith also went to Sunday school at the church in Glengarry and then was a Sunday school teacher.

Judith and Evan Cook met at a dance. They were married on 17th January 1953 at St James Traralgon. After they were married, She and Evan were dairy farmers, although Evan at times worked as a rigger, living in Nerrina, near Leongatha, Yinnar South, the Morwell township, Hazelwood North,

Mirboo North, Lakes Entrance and then Newborough. Tragically, on 30 July 1996 Evan was killed in a car accident near Pambula.

A few years later, Judith met Ray Jackson at a dance in Maffra, an interest they shared for many years. They soon formed a relationship and were married on the 17th of March 2001 at St John's Anglican Church in Maffra. After their marriage, Judith and Ray lived on the farm where Ray had been share farming for some years. In 2003, they moved to Moe, to Lloyd Street, then moved to a little unit in a lifestyle village in Traralgon. A year or so later, They moved to the unit in Budd Street in 2019.

Judith has lived a full life, a real lady, compassionate, selfless, with a kind heart and a beautiful soul. She and Ray treated their blended family as one. Between them they have 6 children, 21 grandchildren, 37 great-grandchildren and 1 great great grandchild.

Over the years Judith grew in faith. After Evan's death she became involved in the KYB group for a time and was more connected with the church. In recent years, because of her health, it was difficult for her to sit through a church service, she regularly received holy Communion at home, generally fortnightly. She particularly enjoyed this opportunity to pray for her family. She, Ray and this church community are very grateful for the faithful ministry with Barbara Harvey over this time.

We can truly thank God for Judith life and how our lives are all the better for knowing her.
