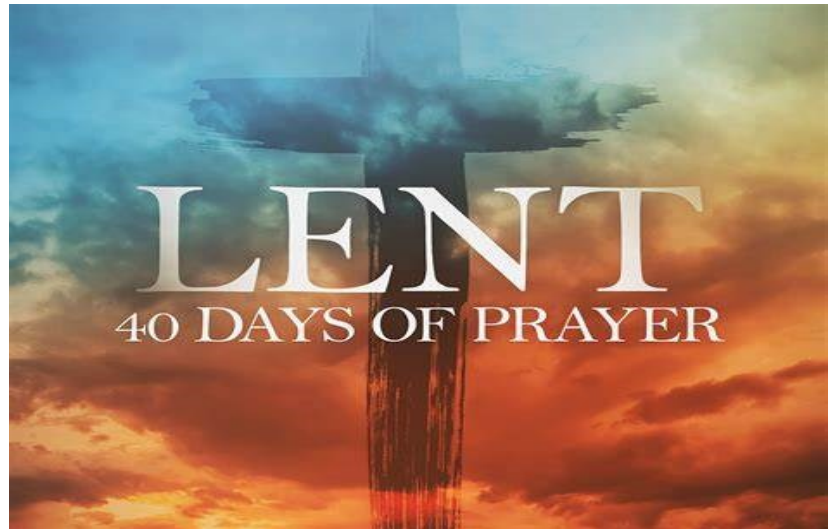

On keeping Lent

The Keeping of Lent, or rather its observance has varied over the millennia of Christian history. Initially it seems that in earliest Christianity it was as brief as a few days. The forty-day observance became common only in the Western church from the fourth century when the pre-baptismal period of preparation became allied with it. Sundays were never included in the total because Sundays are never fast days, so the period had to begin in midweek to make forty. The period of forty days took its origin from the days of preparation undertaken by Moses, Elijah and Jesus himself.

The dietary rules for Lent – keeping the consumption of flesh , meat of any kind – was reduced to a minimum – Friday became a day of abstention from red meat all year and Lent came to be a period of abstention in general. In modern times we have been more relaxed in keeping rules about fasting. We look for a different ways of observing fasts, but all too often perhaps, cease such observances completely and our spiritual lives become flatter.

Do we need different ways of “keeping a good Lent”? In church we still mark Lent by the colour of vestments and the cycle of prayers and readings. These are outward markers. But what of spiritual ones? The instruction to “rend your heart and not your garments” is still relevant . We are called to use our creativity in our spiritual lives .

The imposition of ashes at the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday is a particularly deep symbol of what should be our Lenten approach - here words are used that are reminiscent of those from the funeral liturgy. We need to be reminded of our earthly origins. “Remember, that you are dust and to dust you shall return”. Lent reminds us too, in the stories of the growing tension between Jesus and the outwardly righteous, that choices must be made in the daily course of our daily living and which show the direction we are taking.

The habit of a daily recollection will act as a corrective to excessive self-concern in this Lenten season. TS Eliot's poem **Ash Wednesday** has helped me to remain focussed over the years.

"Blessed sister, holy mother, spirit of the fountain spirit of the garden,

Suffer us not to mock ourselves with falsehood

Teach us to care and not to care

Teach us to sit still

Even among these rocks,

Our peace in His will

And even among these rocks

Sister, mother

And spirit of the river, spirit of the sea,

Suffer me not to be separated

And let my cry come unto Thee."

Consecration of the Rt Rev'd Scott Lowrey



Fr Scott was consecrated as a Bishop in the Church of God, on Saturday 8th February in St Paul's Cathedral, Melbourne. Eight deacons were also ordained at this service, which was the last ordination service for Archbishop Philip Freier before laying up his Pastoral Staff the following day at Evensong. Bishop Garry Weatherill, Anglican Bishop of Ballarat, the preacher and now acting Metropolitan, commented that although ordaining deacons and the consecration of a Bishop at the same service was not the usual practice, it was very significant in reminding us that all ministry is based on the Diaconal Ministry of service to the church and community.

Parishioners from the various Parishes in which Scott has served, attended the service, including a number from our Parish.

Unbeknown to many of us, there is a significant symbolic connection between Scott and our Parish, not only in his being a former Rector. The Cope he wore for the consecration, originally belonged to Fr Fred Oakley and then Fr Fred Morrey, both Priests and former Rectors of the Parish and Fr Fred. The handing on of something that cloaks a person has profound spiritual significance as with Elijah and Elisha.

Fr Scot also had a stole made by the late Anita Johns, wife of Barry Johns, a former rector of Moe; an alb made by his late mother, Joan Lowrey; a mitre that was the late Fr Michael's, Abbot of the Benedictine Community in the Diocese of Ballarat; his Pastoral Staff was made with wood from Christ Church, Warrnambool, the Parish he has served for some years; his Pectoral Cross is a St John's Cross from Iona and his episcopal ring made by a local jeweller in Warrnambool.

Bishop Gary concluded his sermon that reflected on how the day was both extraordinary and ordinary by saying to Scott and the deacons:

May God who has called you to his service make you worthy.

We are all of us unworthy. But through Christ, God sees us as the beautiful immortal diamonds he's made us to be. May God who has called you to his service make you worthy of his calling.

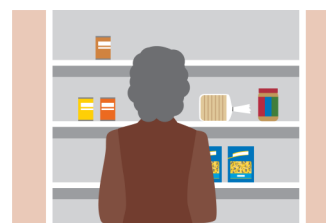
He then went on to address the whole congregation saying:

True for dentists and lawyers, for truck drivers, for drovers, even for opal miners. All of us who are called by God depend on his grace that we might be worthy to respond to that call. PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Parish Council Report February 2025

The Parish Council met on 19th February with an opening prayer by Robyn Ray from Mothers' Union.

The Rev'd Sue Jacka was formally thanked in correspondence for her role as Archdeacon, especially for her chairing of Parish meetings including the Moe- Newborough AGM last November and her rostering of locums during this time of inter-regnum.

Jan Misiurka was formally and heartily thanked for her time of service as treasurer. We are grateful to Rev'd Bruce Charles for being willing to act as treasurer in 2025.

Parish partnership grants are available, so if you have an idea which would promote community connection, please ask the secretary, Julie to forward the guidelines and application forms to you.

Bruce is currently conducting an IT review and decisions are being made about the viability of options specific for purpose and the availability of the internet in certain locations. Thank you Bruce for attending to these important issues. The purchase of a new Laptop was discussed and later executively approved. This will be installed when the IT network is fully set up.

We have received several responses to our request for comment on the Mission/Vision Statements. Thank you to those who responded. The replies are being collated and there will be an opportunity for further review at some parish meetings in the near future.

The Prayer and Meditation Group continues to meet in the Madge Vinnell Centre on Wednesday at 7pm and Men's Breakfast occurs on the first Saturday of the month.

Mothers' Union has had their first meeting of the year with a service of Holy Communion with the Rev'd Judith Lake officiating. The theme this year is Join In, Join Us.

The wardens are continuing, with the support of others, to oversee the furnishing of the Rectory at 49 South St and to attend to maintenance issues ready for the Motisi family's arrival.

The hall at St Luke's requires a final clean out before the official sale is finalised in March. The wardens have been vigilant in keeping up the monitoring of the hall awaiting the finalisation of the sale.

Three month's notice has been given for the reluctant closure of the Newborough Op Shop. We are very grateful for the dedicated service and community support which has been given over the years by many. The Op Shops in Moe and Yallourn North will continue with longer hours depending on the availability of volunteers.

The Community Garden continues to develop and there has been a harvest which has been much appreciated. Our particular thanks go to Ken and Marie Mehaffey, Marion Noppert and the Nicholl's family. Those involved are working towards setting up seating, the creation of an area for reflection and an area of safe, imaginative play for children during working bees.

We are all looking forward to the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Day Lunch at the home of Marion Noppert, 49 Scorpio Drive Moe at 12pm on Tuesday March 4th. Thank you to all those volunteering to assist and of course, particular thanks to Marion for opening up her lovely outdoor space for this occasion.

We are hosting World Day of Prayer on Friday, 7th March at 10am at St Aidan's Church in Newborough. Our focus this year is the Cook Islands with our guest speaker Vi Sear. Get out for Good—using restorative justice for the Kingdom of God.

Every Tuesday in the Madge Vinnell Centre, 10am—2pm.

A program in partnership with the Anglican Criminal Justice Ministry established by Anglicare Victoria. An Anglican Church Welfare Agency.

The “Get out for Good” program, provides social and emotional support for people who have been released from prison to find social and emotional support. It provides a safe space to talk about what they are going through and encouragement to reconnect with family, friends and community. The program acts to strengthen people’s ability to identify and develop their own resources and build capacity while making the adjustment from prison to the “outside”.

The Group is starting to grow and now has ten members. Our current focus is ‘Reflecting on how we experience God in our time together’, particularly in a time of Silence.



The Listening Post

Every Friday from 10am to 12 pm in the Madge Vinnell Centre, at the back of 7 Anzac St, Moe.

(If it is closed for any reason, it will be advertised on this site)

The Listening Post provides an opportunity for anyone in the community who would like to come and share in an enjoyable social morning and chat about their lives, if they feel the need.

It also provides an opportunity to discuss a variety of social and life issues including discussing matters of faith.

Tea, Coffee and a scrumptious morning tea are provided.

The Listening Post also has a food bank that provides some essential food items for anyone in need. The food is free as is attendance.

Newborough Op Shop Closing

At the Parish Council meeting in February, it was decided that the Newborough Op Shop would be closed. The main factors being an increase of the rental of \$200 per week and the poor ratio between Income and volunteer hours raising it.

The Op Shop was opened around 2000 during the ministry of Stephen Morrissey. For many years, a percentage of the profits were distributed to various community organisations as well as to the church. During the ministry of Sathi Anthony, the state of Parish Finances necessitated, the profits of all the Op Shops being donated to the church whilst still continuing to give assistance to people in need who come into the shop.



The closure of the Newborough Op Shop causes us to pause and reflect upon the central role that the Op Shops have in our Parish Ministry. This financial year we budgeted an income of \$111,000 from the Shops. This together with the support, as already mentioned, given to people in need who come into the shops, both in terms of material assistance, particularly in terms of cheap goods but also personal and emotional support, is very significant.

The Op Shops are also critical in our response to the challenges of Climate Change as they recycle so many goods that might just end up as landfill, whilst making cheap goods available, particularly for people on lower incomes as already mentioned but not exclusively to them as many people, whatever their income enjoy buying goods from Op Shops.

All this only happens because our volunteers are so willing to give freely of their time for this work. The dedication of all our Op Shop Workers is amazing and something we should be continually grateful for.

No Date yet for the arrival of Fr Giles and Family

Fr Giles, our nominated Priest in Charge, and his family are still going through the Visa application process. There is no date yet, but we hope it will be soon. Every effort is being made by the Diocese to hasten the process.

Preparations for Fr Giles and Family arrival

The Rectory makes a fine, spacious home as a place of ministry and a family home. It has a Lounge and Dining Room area—sometimes used for various times of ministry such as meetings, interviews etc., Kitchen and Family Room, a master bedroom with on suite, three Bedrooms with a second bathroom and toilet, Laundry and a Study. It also has a two car, car port and garage.

Clergy normally bring their own furniture etc, but this has not been feasible for Fr Giles coming from New Guinea. Consequently the Parish has had to outfit the rectory with essential items.

The Parish has purchased: Fridge, Washing Machine, Dryer, Dining Room Table, Lounge Suite, Queen Size Double Bed, and a King Size Single Bed. A Sofa and two Bean Bags have been donated for the Family Room. A bed for Joanna (daughter) is being organized at the moment.

Parishioners have generously donated some \$3800 to prepare the Rectory for the arrival of the Giles Family.

So far we have spent about \$5892 for the Rectory with great work being done sourcing bargains. We have also bought a Parish Laptop for Fr Giles use.

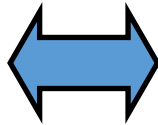

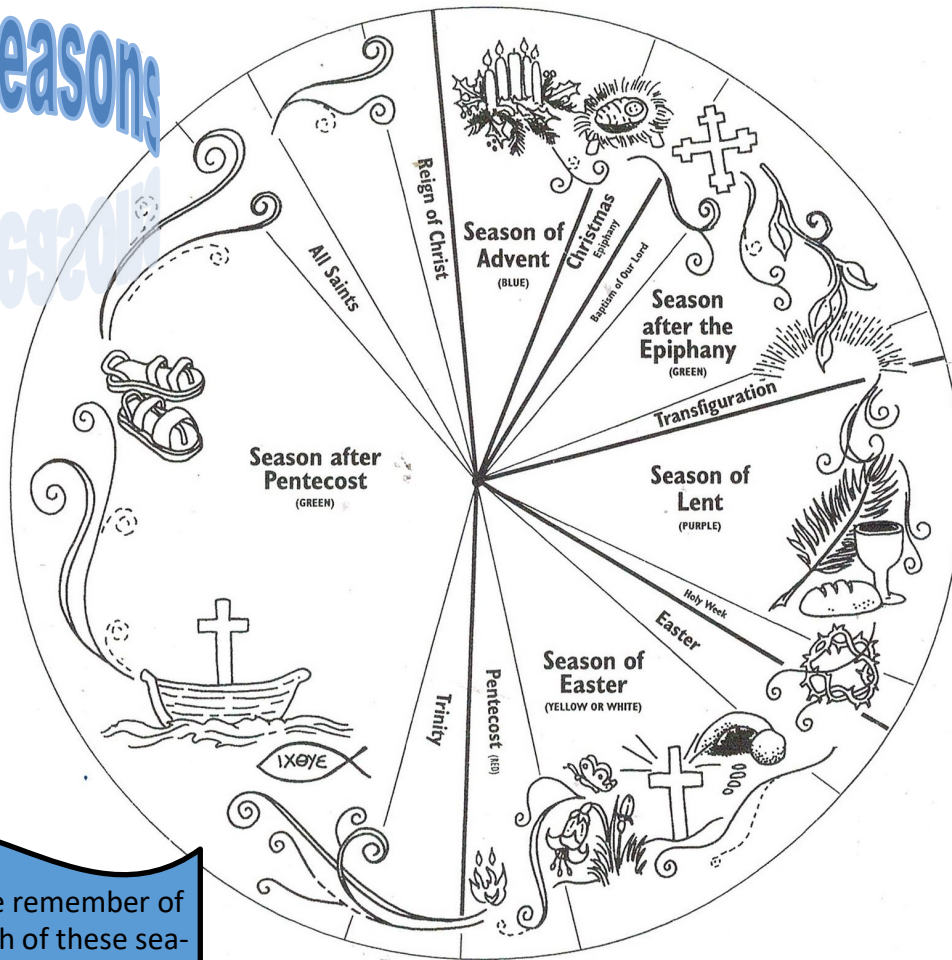

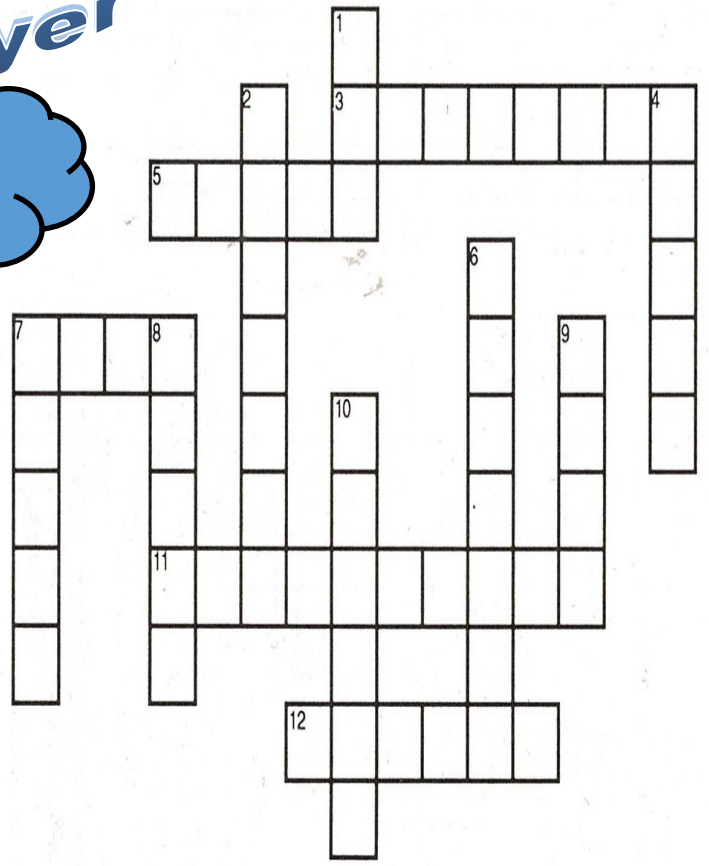

Visiting Aged Care Facilities

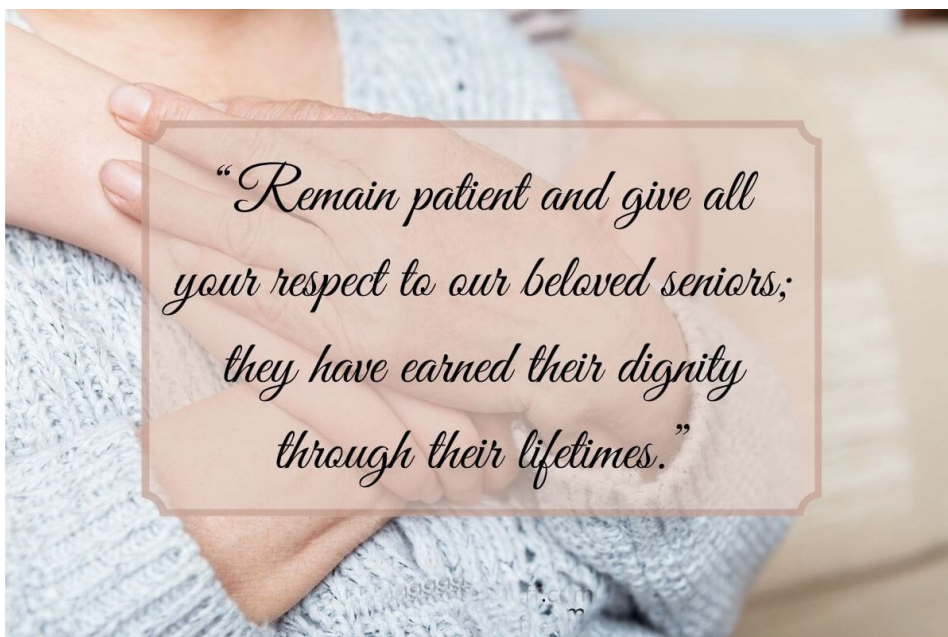
Through all the changing seasons of life our Parish Family are often separated from one another for respite or full-time care but are certainly not forgotten. Recent years and indeed currently, some of our faithful parishioners now reside in our hostels and Nursing homes where visiting restrictions are in place but changeable. Those who can visit and therefore are able to bring us news from the residents, including our Lay Pastoral team, clergy and individual parishioners like to encourage others not to feel restricted from visiting due to unknown procedures (often confusing if you have not been for a while. We respect that such procedures are for everyone's wellbeing.

Currently at Latrobe Valley Hostel, Ollerton Avenue visitors are asked to.

1. Ring Bell at Entrance
2. Be prepared to take a covid test kit provided and wait outside 15minutes for result. **OR PREFERABLY COMPLETE TEST AT HOME** and present negative result tablet on arrival.
3. If test is completed RING BELL at Entrance again
4. You will be met by most **helpful** staff who are **adept at leading you through the computer sign in process, e.g . You will be asked name, phone number, who you wish to visit and choice of estimated visiting time (15min, 30min or longer as appropriate.)**
5. The machine will issue you with a sticker name tape.
6. Staff will assist with directions to resident.
7. ON exiting return to sign in computer. Click yourself out. (AGAIN, STAFF will help) IT IS NOT AS DIFFICULT AS POSSIBLY APPEARS and *REMEMBER WE ALL WANT TO STAY IN TOUCH.*
8. NOTE: Residents now are restricted to 2 visitors at a time, and visitors are asked not to visit extra residents during the trip. (all preventing cross infections if they are around).
9. IT is possible to obtain extra covid test kits for future visits if you enquire at desk, or check at Parish narthex, kits may be available.

We will try to research if procedures are much different at other residences.

Thankyou Helen, Jan and Barb who continue to provide Lay services with Reserve Sacrament, from our main services on a regular basis and bring us news from participating residents, representing our parish in these out-centres in which they preside.

Parishes Finances

As we prepare for Fr Giles and family to join us and for Giles to take on the role of Priest in Charge of our Parish, it is important that we reflect upon how we can ensure that we will continue to have the financial capacity to support his ministry.

At our last Annual Meeting, our previous Treasurer, Jan Misiurka presented a well prepared budget that included some nine months of providing for the costs of this ministry. At best it seems it will be six months in this financial year.

We need to look ahead to our next budget for the financial year October 25 to September 26 where the Ministry Costs will be for 12 months.

As these are early days in this process, we need to pray for guidance as to how to increase our income.

Currently, our Income is primarily made up of the Offertory (Both Sunday Services Collections and Direct Debit into our Bank Account), one off donations, the Op Shops, which make up the largest share of our income and Fund raisers. This will be less with the closure of the Newborough Op Shop. Whether we use interest from Trust Accounts needs to be clarified.

We invite people to consider whether they can increase their giving, even by a small amount by giving weekly with the envelopes, if not already doing so or by Direct Debit. (Details on back page)
